
### Correction

# **Smith Hollow School Project Update**

It looks pretty messy out on Smith Hollow. But, this mess signals progress! Some deconstruction is necessary while we prepare the Smith Hollow School for its move to town this spring. John Houston and his wife Linda removed the non-original chimney from the east wall and the bricks are being salvaged for use as landscaping at the school's new site in Dayton.

Gene Crothers and crew have carefully removed the siding from the stage addition. The entire back section must be taken off piece by piece and then rebuilt in town. Even after the school itself closed its doors to students, the

stage room was such an integral part of the building's function as a community center, that it will be retrofitted as a new community space for rotating exhibits.

The front section with the cupola must

also be moved separately from the main body of the school. But separating and moving it in one load will be left to the moving professionals. Then the school room itself will comprise a second load

# **School Memories**

We are so pleased that Jacque (Alexander) Workman of New York returned our Columbia County School Survey. She attended Smith Hollow School and fondly remembers her teacher and her classmates from the Crider family. Here's a slightly condensed version of what she wrote:

I was a "Great Depression" baby, born in 1928. My father's background was ranching in Colorado. We began to move

to find work, so by the time I was in fourth grade we had lived in four states before coming to Washington. I began first grade in Utah at age 5. In Washington we lived in Walla Walla, Starbuck, Dayton, and finally settled in Waitsburg where I graduated from high school in 1946. So many schools were attended for short periods of time.

I do remember going to Smith Hollow School. It had to be in 1935 or 1936. The pot bellied stove and water pump were there—I was beginning fourth grade, I think. I had real trouble with arithmetic as it was called then. I learned my Times tables because the man who taught there stood me at the blackboard daily until

I had them down pat! It was a miracle! But, I don't remember his name.

I remember playing baseball in a yard that slanted downhill—we ran a lot to get balls! The outhouse the girls used was on the window side, so everyone got to watch as you trudged out to use it, which was mortifying, of course!

My mother had to drive me to school as we lived up in the hills but, yes, kids did walk or ride a horse.

I think I only went to Smith Hollow for part of a year, but it was a real privilege. It was a peaceful leveling- off experience of individual instruction and I will always be glad I had that chance.

The Palus Museum has expanded its exhibit area into the building immediately next door (424 E Main). The stage curtain from Star School provides a stunning backdrop for the new country school and homestead exhibits. Ernestine Peabody of Dayton's Peabody Hill fame painted the dramatic curtain scene which was also used in the Star

Clubhouse after the school itself closed. Thanks to Dallas Dickinson for donating the teacher's desk formerly used at the Marengo School.

Many rural teachers lived with families near the schools where they taught. So, the Museum Annex displays include artifacts for both the Smith Hollow School project and the homestead log

cabin project (including a fainting couch!) Sneak peeks at other aspects of early settlement life in Columbia County are included. Thank you Darlene Lambert for the wood cook stove and Bob McCauley, Dot Mead, Audrey Sturdevant and others for the antique butter-making equipment, cookware and utensils.
