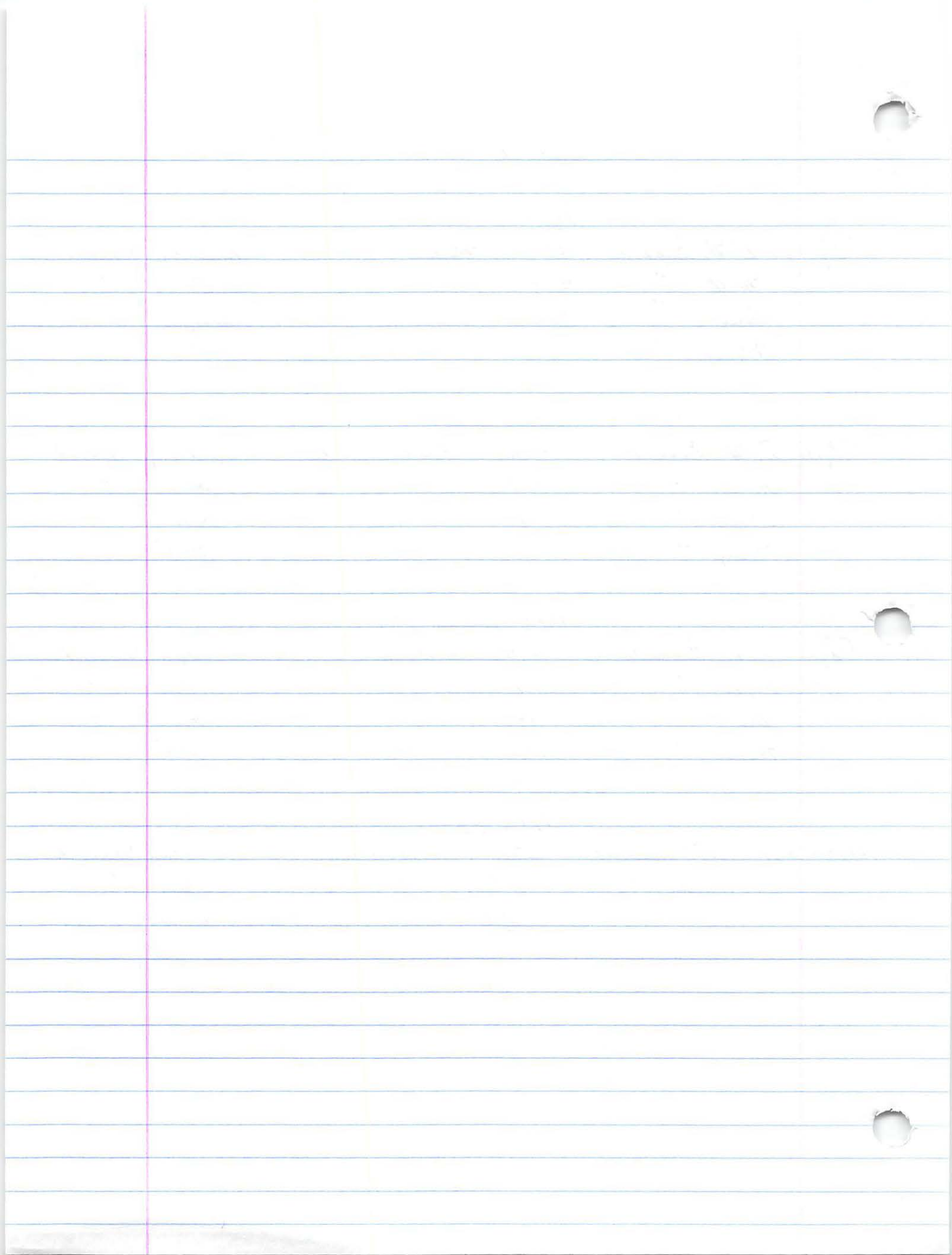

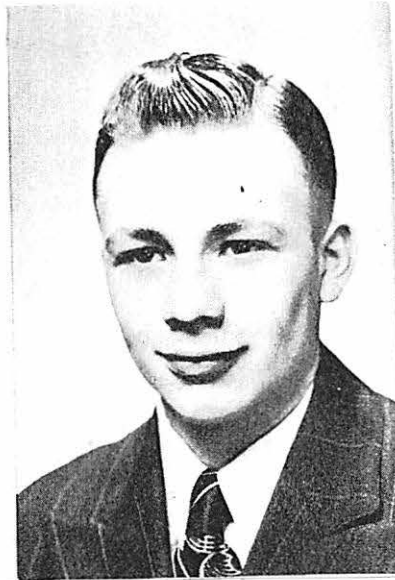

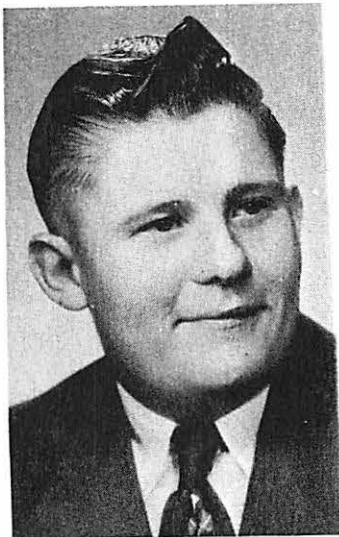

# 1915 graduate reminisces about school 73 years ago

## Mrs. Gaines to lead Saturday morning parade

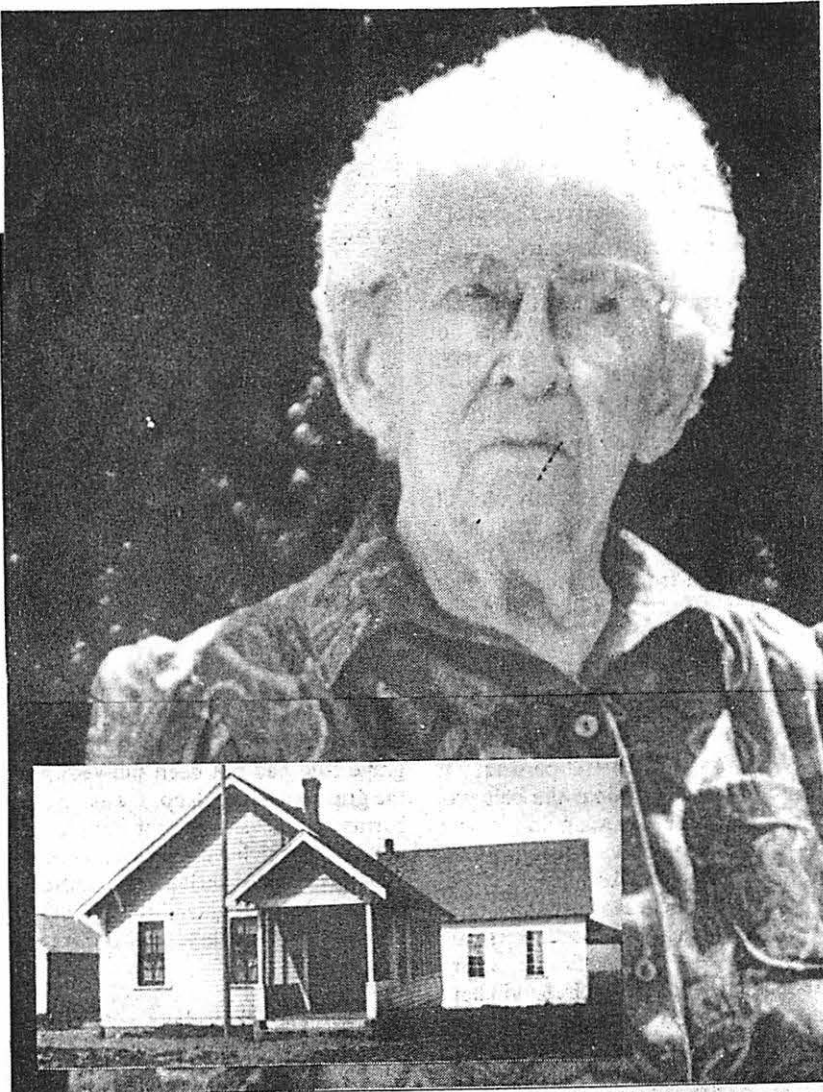

She shakes her head when she says that times have changed. When Mildred Gaines attended Dayton High School, students studied. And after-school activities didn't exist.

"We never had any dances—we just went to school. At that time, we didn't know any different," smiled Gaines.

"We went to school to learn," she emphasized.

Gaines's unique perspective lends credibility to her comments. After all she's been out of school for 73 years, an esteemed graduate from the

Dayton High School Class of 1915.

Gaines, born to Laura (Todd) and James Patrick McLarry on Crall Hollow at the old Spencer place, attended Columbia County schools for all but three years of her scholastic career. She attended school in Portland, Oregon during that time.

She enjoyed high school immensely, noting that at the time, it served a student's recreation needs as well. Her class graduated 23 students, which was considered a big class at the time. There were five boys and 18 girls.

The boys did play baseball, recalled Gaines, but there were no sports girls, as there are now. With no gymnasium, school officials had to consider space and consequently limit activities.

Gaines's memories of her eighth grade teacher, W.W. Hendron, are vivid. A strict disciplinarian, Hendron also displayed a hot temper. But as quickly, recalled Gaines, he could get over being mad.

Once he became furious with one of the McLarry sisters and threw an apple at her. The sister, equally as angry, picked up the apple and threw it back. Her aim was poor, says Gaines, so the fruit missed its target. Hendron snapped his fingers as

though nothing had happened and directed the class to get back to work.

"He was a good teacher," said Gaines, although she concedes that a student with a strong backbone would have been better off in Hendron's than the meek and mild learner. Once after he'd been bullying her a bit, Hendron remarked to her that she must not have inherited the temper of her apple-lobbing sister.

Gaines was the second youngest child in a fairly large family, with four sisters and three brothers.

Gaines spent her first two years of school attending the Mt. Vernon School near Crall Hollow. The school house was less than a mile from her home so she and family members walked when the weather was good. When foul weather arrived, Gaines recalls her parents hauling the kids to school: they rode a sled in the snow and a buggy on other inclement days.

Teachers at the school lived with Gaines and her family since her mother always boarded them, and so she remembers her teachers well. She recalls a fairly even mix between men and women who came to teach the 15 or so children at the school.

One teacher in particular, Ed Davis, later became the Columbia County Sheriff.

After two years at Mt. Vernon, Gaines parents moved into town, signaling the end to her mountain schooling career.

Gaines remembers two of her fellow students particularly well. One was a girl who was always making faces and the other was her brother-in-law who scratched his head. He did this, explained Gaines, when he was faced with a tough problem. She never could figure out whether the scratching stimulated his thinking or not.

Of all her classes, Gaines enjoyed the hard sciences the most.

Mathematics, botany and zoology ranked high on her list. When she attended high school in Portland, said Gaines, she also liked the art classes, which weren't offered in Dayton.

Graduation in June of 1915 took place in the old theatre in downtown Dayton, recalls Gaines. Students sat on the stage during the ceremony, charmingly framed between two potted palms. Two of the boys in her class, who happened to be sitting in the end positions, demonstrated their wily wit by scooting their chairs behind the palms so that no one in the audience could see them.

Dayton still has smart alecks like that, remarked Gaines, wryly.

Her class graduated in June and the theatre burned down the next September. It was a great loss, said Gaines. Amateur theatre groups performed there drawing big audiences, as well as other community entertainment.

After graduation, Gaines stayed at home until her marriage to Ray E. Gaines in 1916. At that time, she moved to the Whetstone, and save only short periods of time, has been there ever since. Ray died in 1980.

Together they had five children: James Pendleton of Auburn; Howard Dowell of Kennewick; Thelma Rae of Ava, Missouri; Larry Dean of Dayton; and one son who died in 1979, Asil Lee. Larry manages the family farm.

In addition, Gaines has eight grandchildren and one step-grandchild, nine great-grandchildren and five step-great-grandchildren and one great-great-grandchild.

Gaines enjoys fancy-work, including crocheting, making afghans and quilts and maintaining her garden. Gaines maintains a luscious garden herself at her Whetstone home. She credits her granddaughter, Mikki, with its beauty, saying, "She's my gardener now." Mikki,

daughter of Larry and Bev Gaines, lives with her grandmother, handling chores and cooking.

As a member of the garden club, Gaines helped plan and execute the landscaping around the present

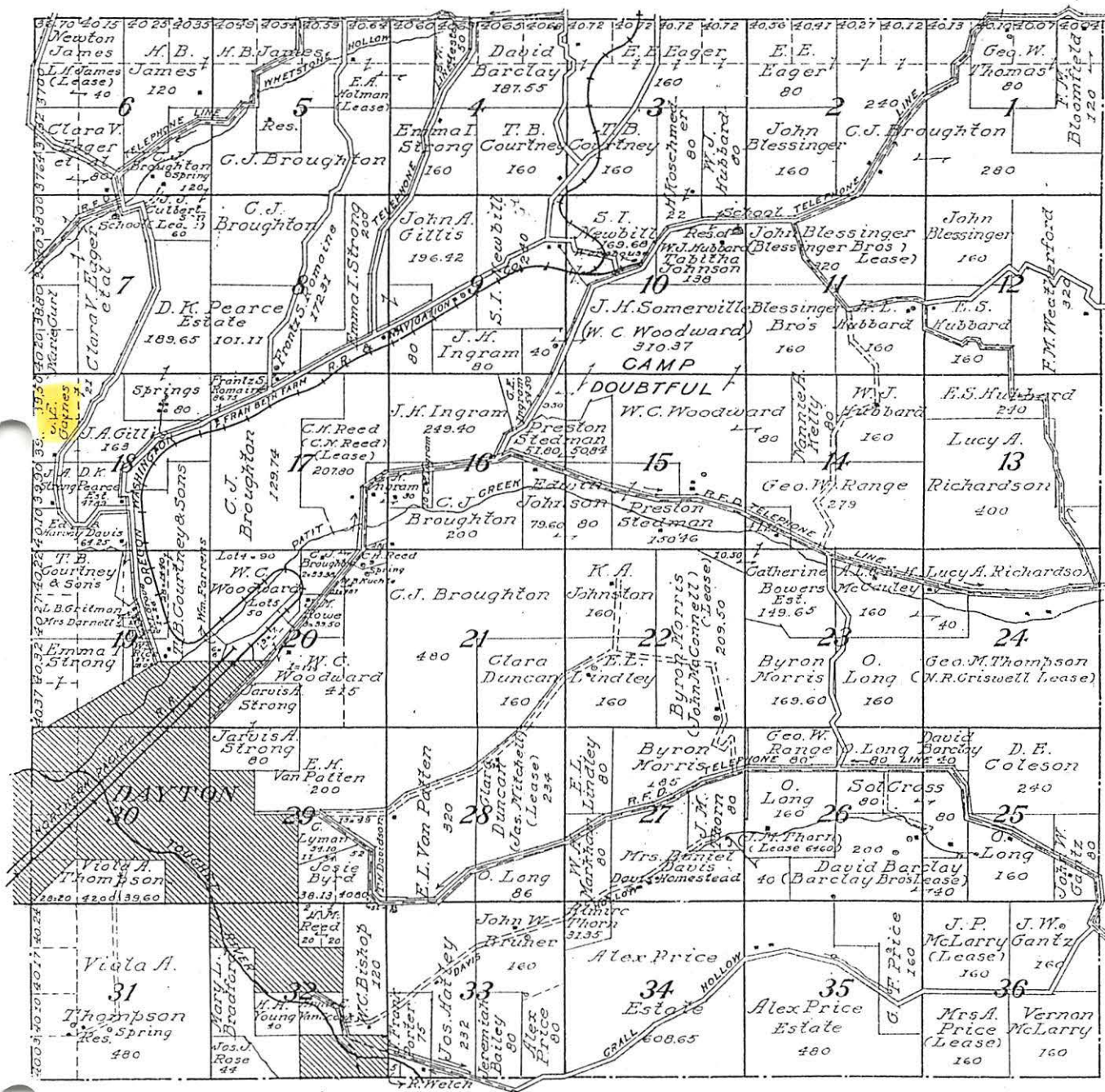
Dayton General Hospital building.

Active in the hospital auxiliary as well, she helped make and distribute, "Binky Dolls," which were cuddly puppets given to children admitted to the hospital.

Mildred Gaines remembers her high school days with great fondness. They were fun but the emphasis was clearly on learning. From a perspective of 73 years, that's more than enough.

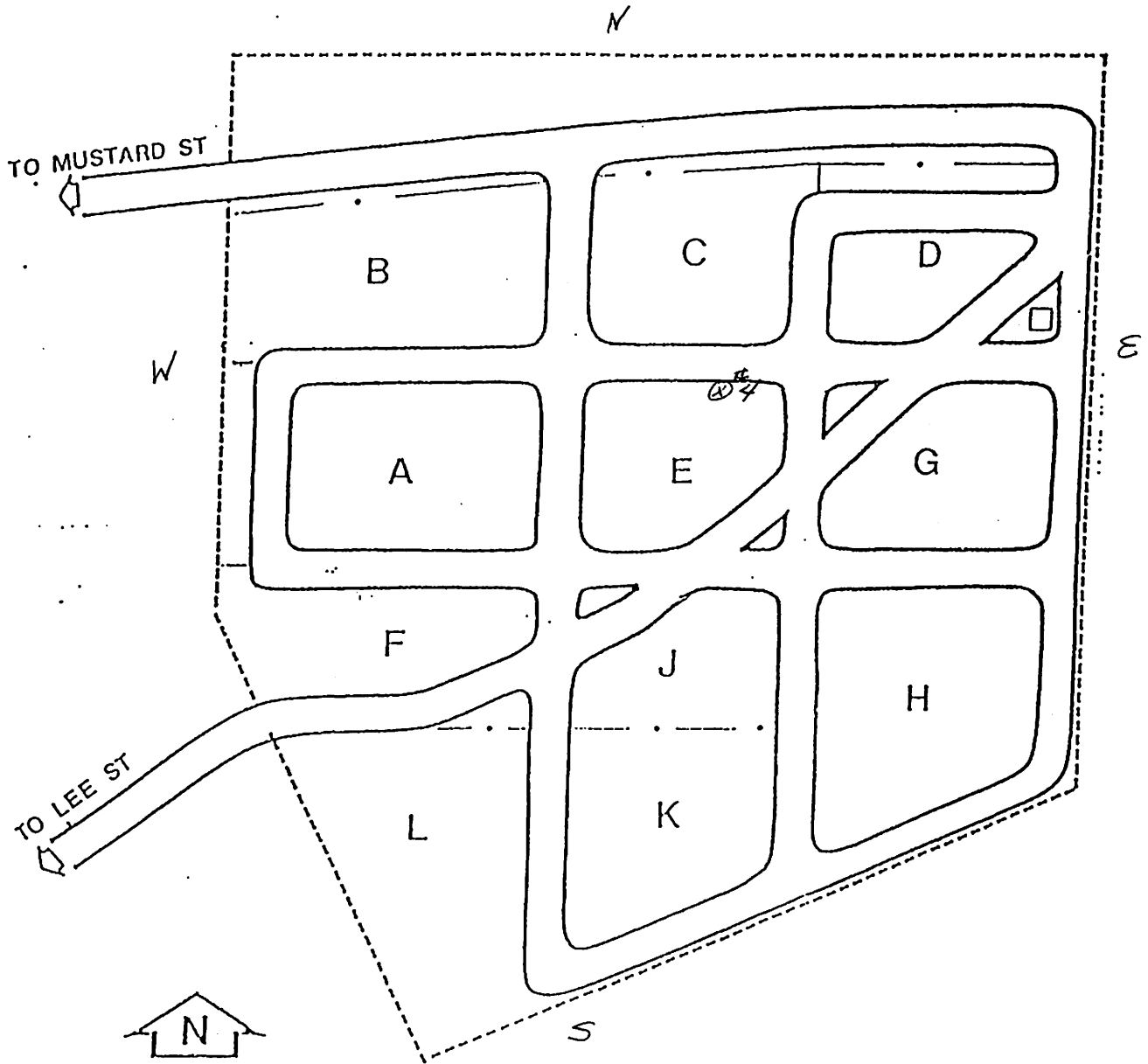

**JAMES STERLING GALLOWAY.**—Among the enterprising young business men of Walla Walla stands the subject of this sketch. He was born in Adams county, Illinois, August 27, 1857. His father, Isaac N. Galloway, was a native of Virginia, and married Miss Sarah Sterling, a native of Pennsylvania. He removed to Illinois in 1850, settling on a farm and taking up agricultural life. At the outbreak of the war he enlisted in the Third Missouri Cavalry and served three and one-half years, and died in 1883, never having recovered from injuries received while in the army.

Appleton's history speaks of Benjamin Franklin leaving for England before the Revolutionary war and placing his private papers in the care of a Mr. Galloway, a lawyer of Pennsylvania, who was a man of considerable notoriety, and who was his trusted friend. This gentleman was an ancestor of our subject, and the profession of law has been the occupation of many members of the family. When Isaac Galloway died he had reached the age of fifty-two years, but his wife is still living, in Illinois. Three children comprised the family, and of these our subject is the oldest.

When James had reached the age of twenty-two years he decided to take Horace Greeley's advice, and to "go West and grow up with the country." He arrived in Oregon with but 5 cents in his pocket, but with a determination to succeed and a will that augured for the attainment of desired ends. He finally arrived at the decision that the farm was not the place for him, and, after passing six months in agricultural work, he entered Santiam Academy at Lebanon, where he finished his education, graduating in the department of pharmacy in 1885. In 1886 he came to Walla Walla, arriving in the town with \$1.75 as cash capital. He engaged as clerk in a store at the nominal salary of \$50 per month, but at the end of one year was compelled to relinquish this work on account of impaired health. For three years following

he devoted himself to the study of medicine and pharmacology, but identified himself with no particular enterprise, making the recovery of his health his chief consideration. At the end of the time noted he formed a co-partnership with Mr. J. W. Estet and purchased the city drug store, but remained there only a short time, selling his interest to his partner. In the fall of 1892 he purchased the old Dr. Day drug store, and is now conducting the same as sole proprietor. He has a fine store and an excellent patronage, and, as he has shown fine business qualifications, he will probably become one of the financial pillars of the city in the future. Since coming from the East our subject has done well. He arrived in Oregon with limited means, but now his stock is worth \$6,000 and is all his own, while he is master of a profession which anywhere will give him a comfortable subsistence. Politically he is a Republican, but not at all radical, and votes for the man rather than the party when it comes to county officers.

While Mr. Galloway will be found to be one of the most courteous gentlemen of his profession, still he has proved himself a thorough business man, ever confining himself to the observance of the old maxim, "Business first and pleasure afterward."

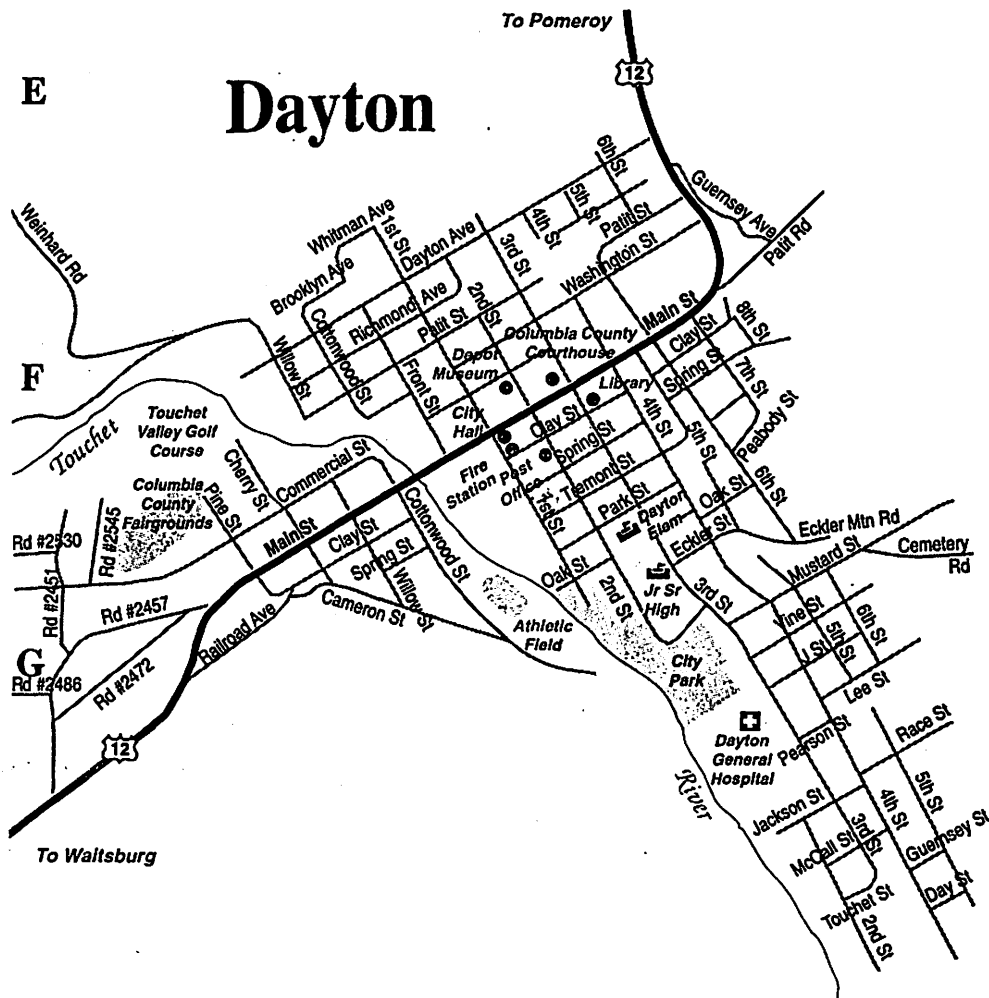

## Old Cemeteries Given Attention

### HIGHLAND CEMETERY

This cemetery is located a little less than a mile from the top of the Hartsock grade, on land which has been in the possession of the McCauley family since about the year 1883.

Among the early settlers were Jonathan T. Haskins, John J. Galloway, Morgan Farr, and William H. Hartsock. The cemetery is located on the John J. Galloway homestead.

The government survey of the township was finished in October, 1872. According to the field notes made by the surveyor at the southwest corner of the Galloway homestead, he crossed the fence of John Sargent, and further up the line he observed the house of Jonathan Haskins, and he also crossed a road leading from Whetstone's to Bear Valley.

At the close of the field notes, the surveyor has added this bit of Indian lore:

"There is a curious Indian tradition in reference to this part of the country. They say that the white man's God came to make the country, and having finished the Spokane and Palouse, he turned his attention to the Tukkannon. Having formed the ridges and spurs as they are now seen, he commenced to level and finish his work by sifting loam and sand and had leveled that portion between the Pataha and Alpowa when they held a council and decided to stop him in order that they might have a hunting ground. They collected in great numbers and so frightened him that he left his work unfinished."

The only records available as to the burials in this cemetery are the inscriptions on the tombstones.

The grave of William Hartsock occupies quite a prominent place in the cemetery. On the stone at his grave is the following data: William Hartsock, Co. G, 11th Ill. Inf."

Among the burials are the following: Joseph Martin, 1911; Sarah Wolfe Patrick, 1897; J. F. Patrick, 1906; daughter of Tyra and Sarah Hutchens, 1891, age 5 years; daughter and son of W. M. and C. J. Homesley, 1892, ages 3 and 8 years; daughter and son of J. and S. Keeney, 1893 and 1894, ages 6 and 13; Jane, wife of Jesse Walker, 1898, age 40 years; daughter of Jane and Jesse Walker, 1899, age 17 years; Benjamin M. Nead, 1897, age 6 years; son of Sheridan and S. E. Galloway, 1894, age 24 days; Alice Ogden, 1890, age 37. Typical of the early ages at which most of these passed away is the following epitaph on one of the stones: "Little time on earth she spent, till God for her his angels sent."

In the July 12 issue of the C-D John Wallace had a story about the Highland cemetery. The article gave a listing of several persons whose names appear on tomb stones. One of my neighbors, whom I had met earlier, had told me of coming to that district in an early day and I wondered if among those names John had listed some were her kin.

One of the names was that of John J. Galloway. On inquiry I learned that he was the grandfather of my neighbor, Mrs. Charles (Lucinda Galloway) Hales. Not only was he kin, but he was the first person buried in the Highland cemetery (not far from the top of the Hartsock grade). The ground for that cemetery was given, for the purpose, by Mrs. Hales' father, John J. Galloway.

Mrs. Hales also has two sisters and a brother buried in the cemetery. The three children were victims of a diphtheria epidemic that swept through the whole territory. A brother, Sheridan Galloway, also has a baby buried there.

Mrs. Hales was born in the Willamette valley. She landed at Highland in 1871 when she was three years old. Her folks had decided that they didn't like the Willamette valley and pulled out looking for a location east of the mountains. They first visited the Yakima valley, "but that was the year of the Modock Indian war," Mrs. Hales recalls, "and after giving a look at the country, father decided there was a better land and he headed for the district around what is now Pomeroy."

After going up the Patit and reaching the point near the top

of the Hartsock grade, the decision to locate there was rather forced upon the pioneers. It had been a terribly dry summer and stock feed was scarce. The Galloways besides their horses, were trailing some cattle. "When the stock gave out on us and we came to a little log hut that somebody else had built ahead of us, father decided that was a good place to locate," Mrs. Hales reports.

Her father and grandfather immediately set about building a home. The first house was just a two-room affair of the simplest sort of construction. "There were no carpenters available so father had to do his own work," a do-it-yourself effort as Mrs. Hales remembers it. She doesn't remember whether the lumber for that house came from Waitsburg or a mill on Eckler mountain.

Mr. Galloway built another and larger house later and the materials for one came from one of the above mentioned sources and the material for the other came from the other source.

Twelve years after locating on Highland, Mr. Galloway decided he had to seek a new location for the benefit of the youngsters' schooling. The place which Mr. Galloway had homesteaded was sold to John McCauley and the family went back to the Willamette valley.

They didn't like that part of the country the second try any better than they did the first and after spending a winter there, they again headed east.

This time they settled on Butter creek in Morrow county, Oregon, at the forks of the creek. There they lived until after Mrs.

Hales was married in 1888.

The Hales divided their time between Heppner, Oregon, and the Galloway place which they operated part of the time, until they moved to the place a mile and a half east of Waitsburg in 1898, and where Mrs. Hales still lives and has with her her son-in-law and daughter, Mr. and Mrs. Leland Kessler.

The Hales got started in the sheep business soon after their marriage and this developed into quite a large spread. After coming to Waitsburg, Mr. Hales acquired a large winter range in the Pasco neighborhood. In the summer the sheep were taken to Montana and the ranges of the Blue mountains south of Dayton.

Mrs. Hales had eight children, four of whom are still living. One of them, Alfred, now passed 60, was associated for years with his father in the sheep business. And a man, still "in the family" and working for the Kesslers, Frank Bramlett, was for years a camp tender for the sheep outfit. (Now he's an expert dozer man).

Part of the Hales sheep range in the Pasco area this year is producing 25-bushel wheat. Another part, farmed by one of Mrs. Hales' grandsons, and watered with an overhead sprinkling system, is producing a record crop of potatoes and some other vegetable the reporter has forgotten.

Mrs. Hales has lived a full life. From a tot on the open ranges of an empire, she has endured the hardships of the pioneer, achieving success. She has cooked for large crews and mothered "leppy" lambs, she has shoveled hay and tended chickens, and probably split wood for the wood-burning cook stove, and nursed sick kids through the night hours after a day of hard labor to be followed by another just like it.

But none of these hardships have seemed to hurt or dispirit Mrs. Hales. It was only recently, in her 88th year, that she had her first sick spell. "I think they said it was a heart attack," she confided. And she didn't like it.

Especially that part of it that required her staying in bed for a month, "having somebody waiting on me," she disgustingly exclaimed.

A life-long hobby of Mrs. Hales has been growing flowers. And as is usual with those who love flowers she has grown some dandies. Many of the late family photos show Mrs. Hales surrounded with or tending flowers.

Mrs. Hales was something of a horsewoman in her early life. And while still living with her folks on Butter creek she "carried the mail" horseback. But she was quite the lady. Her riding was done sidesaddle. "I don't remember being on a horse since we moved to Waitsburg," she said.

Mrs. Hales' four living children are: Alfred of Pasco, Marion of Longview, recently of Walla Walla; Mrs. Kessler, and Mrs. Horace (Gertrude) Sullivan of Salt Lake City, here visiting her mother and helping care for her during the harvest season.

The funeral was held from the U. B. church at 1:30 p. m., Friday, the Rev. F. L. Cook of the Methodist church, of which Mr. Galloway was long a member, officiating. The remains were taken to Waitsburg for burial.

## Native Son Dies May 10

George S. Galloway, 84, native son of Dayton, died at Power County Hospital in American Falls, Idaho, May 10 after a brief illness.

Funeral service was conducted from the Methodist church in American Falls with interment at Fallsview Cemetery.

Mr. Galloway was born December 26, 1880, in Dayton, a son of John G. and Mary Adkins Galloway. He married Edna Hubbard at Dayton on March 8, 1903.

He ran a livery stable and furnished horses and carriages for a taxi service. The couple moved to American Falls in 1914 where he operated a freight and draying business and later dry farmed in the Sunbeam area. Mr. Galloway worked for the highway district and for the railroad during World War II. He retired in 1946.

He was a member of the IOOF Lodge and Methodist church.

Members of the family include a son, Ray, of American Falls; six daughters, Mrs. William Blaser and Mrs. Betty Freeman, both American Falls, Loretta Taylor of Laguna Beach, Calif., Fleta Parrish and Dorothy Abercrombie of Aberdeen and Bonnie Rice of Pocatello, Idaho; 20 grandchildren; 34 great grandchildren, and two great-great grandchildren.
