

Starbuck Residents ca. 1883







Pearson Ranch on Eureka Flat
Walla Walla County, early 1900's





CHARLES PEARSON FAMILY

Because there are no diaries or letters, we can only make assumptions about the crossing of the Plains by the Charles Pearson family. However, we know from Sarah's obituary that they arrived in Dixon on August 27th 1853. Since the trip on the Oregon/California Trail generally took 6 months, they presumably left in March 1853 from Cole County, Missouri where a number of the children were born.

Charles and Sarah Caffee Pearson were married in Missouri in 1837. Charles had been born in Virginia in 1813; Sarah in Hancock County, Tennessee in 1817. Their first child, Josephus (later Joe S.) was born, presumably in Missouri, in 1840. At the time of the prairie crossing he would have been 13.

We know from the 1850 census of Cole County, Missouri that Charles and Sarah had at that time 8 children including Josephus (later Joe S.), age 11, John, age 10, Edward, age 8 (who died at 16 in 1857), Mary, age 6, Penelopy (sic), age 5, Letty, age 2, Louisa, age 2 (presumably Sarah Louise who died in 1906), and Henry, age 6 months (presumably James H. who was born in 1849 and died in Colorado of measles in 1880.) Edward W., James and Sarah Louise are on the Dixon monument. The reference in Sarah's obituary is to 13 children of whom two had died (Edward W. and James H.). The older Penelopy seems to have married young or somehow was not subsequently accounted for.

From the diaries of others we know of difficult river crossings with long waits, high tolls. We know of deaths from cholera, although evidently all 10 in the family made it to California. They probably crossed the Mississippi, the Cedar River, the Des Moines River, the Missouri at Council Bluffs, the Wood River, the Platte River and the Sweetwater (a branch of the Platte). They may have seen Independence Rock where many pioneers (and perhaps the Pearson's) signed their names and Devil's Gate on the Sweetwater. They no doubt had oxen, cattle, horses and had to constantly find fresh water and forage for these animals. In Indian Territory, they may have lost some animals to hostile Indians and they may have exchanged greetings with the peaceful Sioux. Somehow the family made it to Dixon, California where they could buy land and settle down as farmers.

The plots of land registered to C. Pearson in various documents and in a plat indicate they had 160 acres and 400 acres in Silveyville township (Dixon) and 160 acres in Maine Prairie township (next to Silveyville). The latter were sold to an Alexander McPherson in 1861, who may be the brother of Mary A. McPherson who was the wife of Robert Watson and the mother of Nancy Watson (married Joe S. Pearson in Rio Vistas in 1869).

The 1860 census lists Charles and Sarah Pierson (sic) with the following children still at home. John, age 20; Penelope, age 15; Lettie, age 13; Louisa, age 11; James H, age 9; Charles, age 7; Martha, age 6; George, age 2; Harriet, age 10 mos. Edward died in 1857 at age 16 years, 22 days so since he would have been born in 1841, the age of "8" in the 1850 census may be in error. Mary no longer is listed and at 16 may well have married or died prior to 1860. Mary no longer is listed and at 16 may well have married or died prior to 1860. In St. Helena in 1884, appearing in the St. Helena Star as M. Ellen Melgs (see 1870 census below). However she may be the Martha E. in the census. Another heir is Letitia P. Cooper, presumably Letty, who also supplied the death information on the tombstone for Sarah Louise Pearson in 1906. Penelope Porch, also listed is in the 1900 census in Oakland Ward 4, Alameda, California and is living alone. Her birth is listed as 1860 (concurrent with the SECOND Penelope but her birthplace is listed as Missouri (concurrent with the FIRST Penelope who was born in 1845). The mystery of her parentage, remains.

The 1870 census lists Charles and Sarah, Louisa, age 21; Charles, age 18; Ellen (Martha E?), age 15, who was born in California; George, age 12; Harriet, age 10 and another Penelope, age 9 (presumably born in 1861 and possibly the child of J.S. Pearson (see below). Both Charles E and George W. are listed as heirs in 1885. Sarah died in 1876 (Dixon tombstone and obituary from Dixon Tribune)

The 1880 Silveyville Township (Dixon) Solano County census (four years after Sarah died in 1876) lists Charles with a spouse Catherine, age 49 and daughter Louisa, age 30. That year in Alameda census there is a George W. Pearson, age 22 (born in 1858) who is listed as running a "Bathing Establishment." We know that George subsequently held a mortgage on a hotel in Dixon (per the librarian in the Dixon library - Dixon Tribune, January 26, 1878 -

Centennial Hotel. We are sorry to state that Mr. and Mrs. Gerlach have been compelled to relinquish possession of the Centennial hotel, and on Wednesday it was closed. Mr. George Pearson, to whom it was heavily mortgaged has taken possession of the property. In view of the beautiful rains and good business prospect we hope to see this hotel open.)

Charles Pearson moved to St. Helena in 1880, built several cottages there, was divorced from Catherine in 1882 and died in 1884. There is a mystery around the death in that the heirs were unable to find large amounts of cash they knew he had in the house. After the death the yard was dug up in search but there is no sign that anything was found. It is noted that he was buried in Dixon (and confirmed by the monument). This information also confirms that he was born in Virginia and that Sarah was born in Cock County, Tennessee, (probably Hancock County).

Note: The 1890 US census was destroyed by fire many years ago.

The 1900 census shows Charles E. living in Elko Nevada (Mardis Precinct) with a son, Joseph L (born 1887). A Joseph L is buried in the Fairfield/Suisun Cemetery, Plot 178, grave 8 (b.1879, d.1969) and is possibly the same man, though the birth date is different. In 1910 Charles E. Pearson, age 48 is living in Mardis Precinct, Elko, Nevada, alone. Since on both censuses he is listed as being born in Missouri, he was presumably a baby, crossing the Plains. Note: there is a San Francisco census of 1880 which shows a Charles E., married to Emily J. with a daughter Florence. This may or may not be the same Charles E., though they could have had Joseph L. in 1887 and the latter two, father and son, went to the gold or silver mines in Nevada before 1900. In the 1920 census he is living alone in Stonyford, Colusa, California.

JOE S. PEARSON FAMILY

The 1860 census also shows J.S. Pierson (sic) and Geanette Pierson (age 17) living just a plot away from Charles and Sarah and family. We know that Joe S. Pearson married at age 21, in 1859, had a child and was divorced in 1865 because of a divorce ruling in Solano county 7th District Court (Case E1326). It references residence in Malne Prairie Township (next to Silveyville). We don't know who the child was but since there is a female child, also named Penelope, in the 1870 census who is living with the Charles Pearson Family and since the first Penelope seems to have died or married, we suspect this is Joe S. Pearson's daughter (later possibly Penelope Porch). He by that time had moved to Rio Vista, married Annie (Nancy Watson) and in 1870 C.W. Pearson (Charlie), the first of their six children, was born. There was a seventh child, Marguerite who died at age 6 in Dayton, Wa. The obituary says she was the oldest daughter.

→ In 1878, there are news accounts of Joe S. Pearson and family (including James Watson), moving to Oregon Territory and a later reference to Washington Territory. The children Charlie, b. 1870; Sadie Maude (also Lidya M. in one census), b.1874; Marion b.1877/78 moved with them. We know they settled near Starbuck and have a photograph of "Solano Ranch" on Eureka Flats, Walla Walla County. We also know Joe S. Pearson owned a butcher shop in Starbuck and Pearson Hotel, which Anna/Annie later ran. Starbuck was not incorporated until 1895 (A.W. Hukill was the first mayor). Three more children were born in Washington territory - Florence b. 1880, Robert Garfield, b. 1882 and Joseph Upham. (sometimes appears as Joe W.) b. 1884. Marguerite died at age 6, in Dayton/Starbuck, before the picture of all six remaining children was taken when Charlie was about 14 or 15 years. Joe U. is about a year in that picture.

Joe S. was much loved in the town of Starbuck and in the obituary of 1908, is referred to as "Uncle Joe." He continued to run the ranch until his death. In the 1900 census he is listed as living on the Ranch while Anna/Annie is in Starbuck running the hotel and presumably so her younger children can attend school. We presume that Charles W. Pearson (the second Charles Pearson) who by that time had married Rebecca Jane Hukill (born in 1878), inherited that Ranch. They had two sons - the aforementioned Joe S, born in 1910 and Francis Winfield, born in 1915. During the bank failure in the early part of the twentieth century, Charlie became over extended and lost the Ranch to the bank. According to Francis Pearson (Joe S. II's) younger brother, many banks were more tolerant but Charlie's bank foreclosed. The family, comprised of Charlie, Rebecca Jane (now called Jean), Joe S., Francis and Jean's sister Frances Hukill McRae, moved to Spokane, probably in about 1923 to 1925. Joe attended North Central High School and presumably Francis also graduated from that school. Another Hukill aunt, Alice, who never married also lived on the property in Veradale, a suburb of Spokane. Jean ran a restaurant at the home, called Sunshine Cottage and was able to put her sons through college. Both boys began at Washington State University where Francis completed his degree. Joe S. transferred to the University of Washington in Seattle. He married Claire Parmelee Kelley of that city in 1936, and gained a law degree from the University of Washington Law School circa 1935. Joe S. and Claire had two children - Charles Winfield born in 1937 and Claire Parmelee (Pam), born in 1939. The family resided at 1942 East Blaine Street in Seattle. Francis married Virginia Rodgers of Spokane. Their children are Roger (Berkeley), Janis (Berkeley) and Nancy (Spokane).

Joe S. served as an intelligence officer in the Pacific Theatre of World War II under Admiral Nimitz. He returned in late 1946 to start a law practice. He was eventually a partner in the firm of Kahin, Carmody and Pearson. Joe S. became active in Washington State and national politics, supporting Harold Stasson and subsequently Thomas Dewey in the 1948 Presidential Race (won by Harry S. Truman). While campaigning for a friend, George Kinnear, for State Senate in May 1950, he was killed in a car accident in Everett.

Maude Pearson, b.1874, married Dr. Andrew Mitchell Henderson, b. 1872, and moved to Sacramento where she had three children - Thomas Pearson, b. 1901 (ten years older than Joe S. Pearson (the second and father of the subject of this geneology, Charles W. Pearson who was born in 1937), Jo, b. 1904 (died 1981, Pasadena.); Andrew M., Jr., b. 1911 (died July 6, 2004). Andrew M. Jr. remained in Sacramento, marrying Jane Kathryn Finneran in 1940. His son survives him - Andrew M. Henderson III of Carmichael, CA. There are two grandsons, Andrew M. Henderson IV of San Francisco and Thomas H. Henderson of Sacramento.

Jo Henderson married Ester Lillian Everett, b. 1903 (died 1982, Pasadena) and moved to Santa Monica. They had two girls, Margaret (Peggy Jo) Simpson of Spirit Lake, Idaho and Susan France who married Michael France and after a time in Hawaii, returned to La Jolla in Southern California.

Pearson Henderson married Hope Weston, b. 1899, and they lived for many years in San Francisco on Pacific Avenue and then in Santa Barbara. They had no children. After Hope died of emphysema in 1969 (circa), Henderson remarried Gerry _____ from Baltimore. He developed Alzheimer's disease (like his mother, Maude, before him) and died in a nursing home near Santa Barbara in about 1986.



ANDREW P. PEARSON.

Andrew P. Pearson is now living retired in Walla Walla after many years devoted to the grocery business. He was born in Sweden, September 15, 1848, a son of Pear Bengtson, who passed his entire life in that country. Our subject grew to manhood under the parental roof and obtained the education afforded by the common schools. In May, 1869, when almost twenty-one years of age, he crossed the ocean, landing in Quebec, Canada, whence he came direct to the States. He located in Minneapolis, Minnesota, where he found work as a carpenter. He had received training in that line under his brother, who was a carpenter and cabinetmaker. In 1874 he went to San Francisco but a month later removed to Los Angeles, where he entered the employ of the Southern Pacific Railroad. He worked on the timbering of the San Fernando tunnel and proved so capable that

he was promoted to foreman. For about six months he filled that position but in 1876 he decided to take a trip east and see the Centennial Exposition at Philadelphia. From there he went to Sweden on a visit, remaining there for about a year, after which he once more went to San Francisco. He again became connected with the Southern Pacific Railroad, with which he remained until 1880.

Mr. Pearson then came to Walla Walla county, Washington. In connection with his brother, P. P. Pearson, he became the owner of a grocery store and for about twenty years was an active factor in business circles of Walla Walla. He was keen in his analysis of business conditions, up-to-date and enterprising in the conduct of his store and made it a point to carry only reliable goods. This well advised business policy resulted in the building up of a large trade and as his capital increased he invested in Walla Walla county land, thus giving evidence of his faith in this section, and time has proved the wisdom of his course. He now owns about five hundred and fifty acres, situated in the richest part of the Walla Walla valley, and derives therefrom a gratifying income. For a number of years he has enjoyed a well deserved leisure, having retired from the grocery business.

In 1912 Mr. Pearson was married to Miss Hilda Johnson, a native of Sweden. He gives his political allegiance to the republican party but has never sought office as a reward for his loyalty. He belongs to Columbia Lodge, No. 8, K. P., of Walla Walla, of which he was a charter member, and to the Ancient Order of United Workmen. He is respected for his business ability, honored for his integrity and held in the warmest regard by reason of his attractive personal qualities.

CHARLES WINFIELD PEARSON.

Charles Winfield Pearson, residing on the Solano Ranch, section 16, township 12 north, range 36 east, Walla Walla county, is an important factor in the agricultural development of this section, and is successfully operating more than five thousand acres of land.

He is a native of Rio Vista, California, and was born August 3, 1870, a son of Josephus and Anna (Watson) Pearson, the former a native either of Virginia or Kentucky and the latter of Nova Scotia, Canada, and of Scotch parentage. The Pearson family came to the west by the overland route in 1856, and the Watsons made the long journey by way of the Panama isthmus about eight years later. Both families located in Rio Vista and there Mr. Pearson and Miss Watson were married in 1869. They continued to reside there until 1878, when they removed to Columbia county, Washington, locating a mile east of Starbuck, where the father bought railroad land. He took a prominent part in the organization of the first school district in that locality and was also the first postmaster of Starbuck. His time and energy were, in part, devoted to farming, and he became the owner of about one thousand acres. For twenty years he also engaged in the meat business and did considerable contracting in that line for the railroad. He passed away March 10, 1908, and is survived by his widow, who resides with a daughter in Spokane.

Charles Winfield Pearson received a good common school education and also pursued a commercial course at the Empire Business College in Walla Walla. Subsequently he conducted a bicycle store for about two years in San Francisco, after which he returned home and joined with his father in the operation of the latter's land. In 1896, however, he began farming on his own account, leasing school land which he cultivated, and as he was a practical and up-to-date farmer his capital steadily increased. He invested his money in land and now holds title to two thousand five hundred acres, which he operates together with two thousand six hundred acres of leased land. He conducts his agricultural affairs in the same careful and progressive manner as a great business man would control large commercial enterprises, and his annual income is a highly gratifying one.

In December, 1906, Mr. Pearson was united in marriage to Miss Jean Hukill, a teacher in the public schools of Starbuck, and they have become the parents of two children, Josephus and Francis W.

The republican party has a loyal supporter in Mr. Pearson, but he has confined his political activities to the exercise of his right of franchise. Fraternally he belongs to Walla Walla Lodge, No. 287, B. P. O. E., and is popular in that organization. His wife is a member of the Protestant Episcopal church and is interested in all movements for the promotion of the moral welfare of her community. Both are widely known and highly esteemed. Eastern Washington has rapidly come to the front as one of the great farming districts of the country, and this development has been made possible by such men as Mr. Pearson—men who are energetic, alert and keen in judgment and, throughout the same time, willing to cooperate for the advancement of the public interest.

Riparia (S.30;T.30N;R.38E)

Settlement in two parts, joined by a bridge over Columbia River, 18 miles north of Dayton, extreme southwest Whitman and Columbia counties. The post office is in Whitman County, the town's north side. Before the bridge was built, early names were *Texas City* and *Texas Ferry*. The present name was chosen by officials of Northern Pacific Railway Company for the station; it is from the Latin *Riparius*, meaning "river bank."


Riparia, was situated about five miles up the Snake River from the mouth of the Tucannon, on the Columbia County side. It was, then called, South Texas, and the Texas Ferry crossed the Snake river there. A postoffice was established in 1882 with Thomas J. Peabody, postmaster.

On August 12, 1884, the engine house burned and locomotive No. 10, was badly damaged. In the year 1886, the railroad intended to cross the river by means of a transfer boat. The boat was to connect with inclines on both banks, but it was decided a bridge would be built.

The railroad bridge was erected of steel. The piers were made from granite, cut from a high bluff several miles up river. The bridge turned in the center, to allow steamboats to pass. It was so well balanced, it was turned with a hand crank. It was completed in 1888. The town of Riparia, was then moved, to the Whitman County side of the river.

The bell traveled by boat from the East Coast around Cape Horn to the West Coast and by train to Starbuck. It hung in the belfry of the Presbyterian Church in 1893.

The bell tolled "the invitation" from the church belfry for many years. And when the church changed denomination from Presbyterian to Christian, the bell still tolled the same message.

After 30 years of active service in the community, the church closed its doors in 1923. The Starbuck bell hung in quiet solitude until a few years later when the church was sold and dismantled. The bell was placed in storage, where it remained for many years.

In 1953, the town of Starbuck celebrated a territorial centennial and the bell W.H. Starbuck gave the town was taken out of storage. It was placed in the center of the city park on the corner of Front and Baxter streets, where it is seen and enjoyed as the town's oldest treasure.

ZINK'S STORE

A.O. Hammer bought a merchandise store from Thomas and Lena Hawarth who had been in business with their "Mutt and Jeff Store" at Starbuck.

Hammer set up a Gent's Furnishing Store. It was next door to a restaurant which caught fire and burned all the buildings in the block.

In 1912 A.O. Hammer built a concrete building which is still there today. It is now owned by the Zink's. Grace Hammer, daughter of A.O. Hammer, married Zack Zink and they purchased the building.

A harness shop and shoe repair shop were in business at the back side of the store. The signs can still be seen from the alley way and on the side of the building. The two shops were later made into an apartment where the Zink family lived for many years.

A large hotel was built beside the store on the corner of Front and Baxter streets and was called the Pearson House. It burned down and the corner was vacant for many years. It is now the location of the City Park where the Starbuck bell is set.

CHARLES WINFIELD PEARSON.

Charles Winfield Pearson, residing on the Solano Ranch, section 16, township 12 north, range 36 east, Walla Walla county, is an important factor in the agricultural development of this section, and is successfully operating more than five thousand acres of land.

He is a native of Rio Vista, California, and was born August 3, 1870, a son of Josephus and Anna (Watson) Pearson, the former a native either of Virginia or Kentucky and the latter of Nova Scotia, Canada, and of Scotch parentage. The Pearson family came to the west by the overland route in 1856, and the Watsons made the long journey by way of the Panama isthmus about eight years later. Both families located in Rio Vista and there Mr. Pearson and Miss Watson were married in 1869. They continued to reside there until 1878, when they removed to Columbia county, Washington, locating a mile east of Starbuck, where the father bought railroad land. He took a prominent part in the organization of the first school district in that locality and was also the first postmaster of Starbuck. His time and energy were, in part, devoted to farming, and he became the owner of about one thousand acres. For twenty years he also engaged in the meat business and did considerable contracting in that line for the railroad. He passed away March 10, 1908, and is survived by his widow, who resides with a daughter in Spokane.

Charles Winfield Pearson received a good common school education and also pursued a commercial course at the Empire Business College in Walla Walla. Subsequently he conducted a bicycle store for about two years in San Francisco, after which he returned home and joined with his father in the operation of the latter's land. In 1896, however, he began farming on his own account, leasing school land which he cultivated, and as he was a practical and up-to-date farmer his capital steadily increased. He invested his money in land and now holds title to two thousand five hundred acres, which he operates together with two thousand six hundred acres of leased land. He conducts his agricultural affairs in the same careful and progressive manner as a great business man would control large commercial enterprises, and his annual income is a highly gratifying one.

In December, 1906, Mr. Pearson was united in marriage to Miss Jean Hukill, a teacher in the public schools of Starbuck, and they have become the parents of two children, Josephus and Francis W.

The republican party has a loyal supporter in Mr. Pearson, but he has confined his political activities to the exercise of his right of franchise. Fraternally he belongs to Walla Walla Lodge, No. 287, B. P. O. E., and is popular in that organization. His wife is a member of the Protestant Episcopal church and is interested in all movements for the promotion of the moral welfare of her community. Both are widely known and highly esteemed. Eastern Washington has rapidly come to the front as one of the great farming districts of the country, and this development has been made possible by such men as Mr. Pearson—men who are energetic, alert and keen in judgment and, throughout the same time, willing to cooperate for the advancement of the public interest.



HENRY A. JOHNSON.

Henry A. Johnson, a well known stock raiser of Columbia county, has been a resident of Washington for forty years and has therefore been a witness of much of the growth and development of this section of the state. A native of Ontario, Canada, he was born in Lincoln county, August 18, 1844, a son of W. G. D. and Catherine (Miller) Johnson, who were also natives of Canada, where

they spent their entire lives. They had a family of ten children, eight of whom are now living.

Henry A. Johnson spent his youthful days in Canada and acquired his education as a public school pupil there. In 1865 he removed to the middle west, settling in Champaign county, Illinois, where he resided for a decade. In 1875 he made his way to the Pacific coast and located in California, where he spent two and a half years upon a farm. In 1877 he arrived in Walla Walla and in May, 1878, he purchased a herd of cattle and came to Starbuck. He rented a farm for several years but during that period carefully saved his earnings until his industry and economy had brought to him a capital sufficient to enable him to purchase land. He then invested in property which he owned for a time but afterward sold that farm. His wife, however, owns eleven hundred and twenty acres near Starbuck, which is excellent valley land, devoted to the cultivation of hay, fruit and vegetables.

In August, 1909, Mr. Johnson was united in marriage to Mrs. Nancy A. Pearson, a native of Restigouche county, New Brunswick, and a daughter of Robert and Mary Ann (Reid) Watson. Her father was born in Scotland, but her mother was a native of New Brunswick, where they were married. To them were born eight children in New Brunswick and two others were added to the family after their removal to California, Mrs. Johnson being the oldest. It was in 1868 that they came to the Pacific coast and settled in Rio Vista, California, where Mr. Watson owned and operated a ranch and where both he and his wife died. They have three sons still living: William, of San Jose, California; and R. W. and Alex M., both of Great Falls, Montana. Their daughter, Nancy A., was married in Rio Vista to J. S. Pearson and in 1878 they came to Dayton, Washington, being among the pioneers of that locality. Two years later they became residents of Starbuck. Mr. Pearson died at Spokane in 1908. The children born of that union were: Charles W., now an extensive wheat farmer of Eureka flats, Walla Walla county; Margaret J., deceased; Sadie M., the wife of a prominent physician of Sacramento, California; Marian E., whose husband is a prominent railroad man of Spokane; Florence P., the wife of an eminent physician of Sacramento; Robert G., also a prominent physician of that city; and Joseph N., a rancher of Marysville, California. Joseph S. Pearson.

Joseph S. Pearson, one of Starbuck's oldest pioneers, passed peacefully away at 5:40 o'clock, Tuesday afternoon at the Deaconess hospital in Spokane. Mr. Pearson had been in poor health for the last two years, and recently underwent the surgeon's knife, from which he recovered but complications set in and he never arose again from his bed.

Mr. Pearson was born in Illinois in 1840, and crossed the plains to Dixon Cal., in 1854, since which time he has been a resident of some part of the Pacific coast. In 1878 he removed to Columbia county, Washington, and settled on the farm he still owned at the time of his death, located one mile east of Starbuck. During the civil war he enlisted in a California regiment but was never called to the front.

Mr. Pearson was married in California to Miss Annie Watson, who survives him, and also three sons, Chas. W. of Starbuck, Wash., Dr. Robt. G., of Philadelphia, Pa., and Joseph U., of Spokane, and three daughters, Mrs. Maude Henderson, of Sacramento, Cal., Mrs. Marian Wright of Moscow, Idaho, and Miss Florence Pearson of Spokane, Wash., all of whom, except Robert, were at his bedside during his last sickness. He also leaves two brothers and three sisters in California to mourn his loss.

Uncle Joe, as he was familiarly called, was in many respects, public spirited. He made a great many financial ventures in which he was consistently fortunate. He put several saw mills into operation, some of them being the first in Columbia county. He operated a hotel at Riparia for many years, and was the builder and owner of the justly celebrated Pearson House, one of the old land marks of Starbuck.

While all that is mortal of Uncle Joe has been laid to rest in Fairmount cemetery at Spokane, he will ever be remembered by the many friends and neighbors who unite with us in sympathy for the bereaved family.






New Hope School

NEW HOPE

At the foot of the Willow Creek hill, there was a school called New Hope. Church services were held in the schoolhouse on Sundays. It was the United Brethern Rural Church. The school and church started in 1884. Along with the school building, there was a Service Station which was called, "The Last Chance", meaning it was the last chance on the highway to get gas and water before climbing the steep Willow Creek grade. It was then a gravel road and the cars, at that time, traveled slow. The last person to operate the station was Leo Peterson and his wife. They also lived at the station. A few items of food and other notions were kept on hand for sale. New Hope Station went out of business at the start of World War II, long after the school was gone.



STAR OF STARBUCK

Joseph S. Pearson.

Joseph S. Pearson, one of Starbuck's oldest pioneers, passed peacefully away at 5:40 o'clock, Tuesday afternoon at the Deaconess hospital in Spokane. Mr. Pearson had been in poor health for the last two years, and recently underwent the surgeon's knife, from which he recovered but complications set in and he never arose again from his bed.

Mr. Pearson was born in Illinois in 1840, and crossed the plains to Dixon Cal., in 1854, since which time he has been a resident of some part of the Pacific coast. In 1878 he removed to Columbia county, Washington, and settled on the farm he still owned at the time of his death, located one mile east of Starbuck. During the civil war he enlisted in a California regiment but was never called to the front.

Mr. Pearson was married in California to Miss Annie Watson, who survives him, and also three sons, Chas. W. of Starbuck, Wash., Dr. Robt. G., of Philadelphia, Pa., and Joseph U., of Spokane, and three daughters, Mrs. Maude Henderson, of Sacramento, Cal., Mrs. Marian Wright of Moscow, Idaho, and Miss Florence Pearson of Spokane, Wash., all of whom, except Robert, were at his bedside during his last sickness. He also leaves two brothers and three sisters in California to mourn his loss.

Uncle Joe, as he was familiarly called, was in many respects, public spirited. He made a great many financial ventures in which he was consistently fortunate. He put several saw mills into operation, some of them being the first in Columbia county. He operated a hotel at Riparia for many years, and was the builder and owner of the justly celebrated Pearson House, one of the old land marks of Starbuck.

While all that is mortal of Uncle Joe has been laid to rest in Fairmount cemetery at Spokane, he will ever be remembered by the many friends and neighbors who unite with us in sympathy for the bereaved family.

Louis Pellissier, 69, former prominent farmer of this county, died at the General hospital at Grangeville, Idaho, May 14 of heart disease and complications. Funeral services were held from the Hubbard-Rogg chapel of this city Saturday afternoon at two o'clock, with the Rev. Frank Van Doren of the First Christian church in charge. Interment was made at the Dayton cemetery.
